Some Suggestions for Prayer in Masonry

Dear Friends and Brothers,

I am an Anglican Priest, so obviously I have a Christian point of view. It is my call to bring the world to the love of Jesus, whom I believe is the anointed Christ. Although evangelism is my vocation, I am persuaded that no one comes to any faith by unexpected or unwelcome exposure to it. For that reason, even as a priest, it troubles me to hear someone at a Masonic event where many faiths might well be represented, end prayers in Jesus' name. It is offensive in a Masonic context, and frankly, I don't think that anyone wins converts that way. On the contrary, serious and considerate sharing of our faith traditions may open minds to consideration of one-another's beliefs.

One of my goals this year, is to try to help our brethren to open up their faiths, one to another, by sharing some thoughtful and considered prayers and graces for use within the Craft. This does not mean for a minute that I am abandoning my own religious beliefs, but rather that I recognize that not all of the world or all of the Craft shares the same faith. I also recognize that many of you may be better versed in this than myself, and I hope that you will share some of your best materials with me for distribution to the others. Together, we are more able than any one of us alone. That is why I am sending this to all of the DDGMs and District Chaplains for whom I have E addresses. When you receive this, please check with your DDGM or District Chaplain to be sure that he also has a copy. I hope to have more E addresses soon, but thought I would send this out right away before the "season" begins for many of you. You may wish to discuss with one another how this idea fits into the work of your district.

As a basic guideline when planning prayer, Masonic work is based on the Hebrew Bible, or the Old Testament as Christians know it. That source will rarely cause any problem among the great monotheistic religions of the world. The book of Psalms is in fact, a fabulous source of some of the oldest worship and prayers found anywhere in the world.

Some other good sources can be found on the Internet by searching for the terms "interfaith" and "prayer." I prefer not to use the words "non-denominational" or "inter-denominational as they tend to invoke only Christian prayers, and those usually from only the fundamentalist branch of Christianity. I do recommend also, consideration of resources found in the Scouting tradition which shares our situation: a firm belief in a Supreme Being held in common by members of many faith traditions.

For your use then, I have listed a few prayers and graces below that may be acceptable. Some may be carefully modified to meet specific circumstances. I invite you to share with me your favourite inter-faith prayers and graces, and I will try to collect them and perhaps share them in the future. I may be reached at fr.bill@sympatico.ca

And by the way: going to Lodge does *not* excuse a man from attendance at his temple, church, mosque, or synagogue. We do the Most High and our brethren a disservice if we think, do, or say that! Please encourage the brethren of your district to get out on their Holy Day, and pray in the warmth and love of their own faith community!

When using another language, I usually start in that language, and then immediately repeat the prayer in English, followed by the word "Amen" as may be appropriate.

In Hebrew and English, an ancient blessing in the tradition of the Old Testament: *Baruch attah, Adonai Elohenu, Melech ha'olam shehakol ni'heya bi'dvaro* Blessed art thou, Lord our God, King of the universe who has brought about all things by his word. Amen. (Gentiles might want a Jewish friend to help with pronunciation, or go to http://www.hebrew4christians where there are voice recordings available to help.)

Psalm 133: ¹Behold, how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity! ²It is like the precious ointment upon the head, that ran down upon the beard, even Aaron's beard: that went down to the skirts of his garments; ³As the dew of Hermon, and as the dew that descended upon the mountains of Zion: for there the Lord commanded the blessing, even life for evermore. From Bro. Robert Burns (for those who can pronounce it!): "Some hae meat and canna eat / And some wad eat that want it, / But we hae meat and we can eat / So let the Lord be thankit."

Ps. 20:1-4 (*paraphrased*) "May the Great Architect answer you in the day of trouble, the name of the Most High defend you; send you help from his holy place and strengthen you; remember all your offerings and accept your burnt sacrifice, grant you your heart's desire and prosper all your plans."


The **District** meeting was held in the Toronto room and the first order of business was the election of the new D.D.G.M.
